ABOUT US

The Stroke Association of Victoria (SAV) is the only dedicated community-based support service for people re-entering their lives after having a Stroke. The SAV Board has developed a growth strategic plan focusing on a clear program pathway, informed by leading clinicians and of course, Stroke Survivors.

The 'Life After Stroke' Pathway delivers a range of support programs from the moment a Stroke Survivor leaves clinical care, through to meaningful engagement back into their community, including vocational opportunities. Programs that make up the Life After Stroke Pathway include Stroke Support Centres/Hubs, Peer Stroke Support Groups, Recovery Activities and Vocational Mentoring.

Our Stroke Support Centres/Hubs aim to bridge the gap from when a Stroke Survivor leaves clinical care to when they return home and are faced with the challenges of reengaging with their community. Through effective connections with community, a supportive environment and personalised approach, we aim to assist each Stroke Survivor with their long-term recovery. We do this through non-clinical, community-based support and self-led recovery, incorporating leading practice in critical areas, including communication, mood, mobility and community engagement.

GOVERNANCE: STRUCTURE & MANAGEMENT

The Stroke Association of Victoria Inc. is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC).

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The year has seen a significant transformation in the structure of the Stroke Association of Victoria (SAV), including reform at Board level as a result of the implementation of the new Constitution. We have achieved most of the goals set at the beginning of the year and indeed those set out in the 3-year strategic plan that commenced in 2015. One of the most significant to the future direction of the SAV was finally receiving recognition and support from the State Government for our role in Stroke recovery.

During the year, we opened our third Community Stroke Support Centre in Bendigo. The Centre has received encouragement and strong support from the Head of Rehabilitation at Bendigo Health. We will now work with our partners – the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk, Bendigo Council and corporate stakeholders to develop a Community partnership to maintain the sustainability of the Centre.

The Finance Committee has actively worked with our Executive Director to structure our financial position and reporting in a more streamlined way to continue to meet our strategic plan. We are also planning for each Centre to be managed by a small management committee, which will report to the SAV Board and will provide oversight for the ongoing sustainability and daily operations. SAV will be involved in introducing programs and care support consistently across all Centres.

I would like to acknowledge to work of James Garland in arranging and attending many meetings with Members of Parliament, who are in key seats of regions that we are targeting to open new Centres. We have also had terrific support and guidance from Gabrielle Williams MP, Member for Dandenong and Parliamentary Secretary for Health, who visited Barwon Centre and provided introductions to Directors at the Department of Health and Human Services. The Board also employed an organisation to help research and prepare information to assist our case to Government. The cost of this was partly offset by the generous support of Penfold Mazda in Burwood and we also thank them for their contribution.

We also had contributions from a large number of people in the Geelong-Barwon region for the second annual Will2Walk event, which was a huge success, raising well over \$50,000. Massive credit must go to Board member, Claire Greig, for her tireless efforts. We are hoping the Will2Walk concept can become a regular fixture for all Centres as an option for long-term sustainability.



SAV has recently been notified by the Department of Health and Human Services that we will receive funds to open and staff a pilot Community Stroke Support Centre in Newport, as well as one attached to the Royal Park Rehabilitation Centre. We have also been allocated funds to conduct research and develop community engagement for a site in Shepparton.

This funding is a great opportunity to provide the State Government with evidence that the Community Stroke Support Centre Model is worthy of further funding for regions such as the Grampians (Ballarat) and Gippsland (Morwell/Cranbourne). There is still much work to do and we, your Board and staff, are committed to continue the fight for the Stroke community in Victoria.

In conjunction with Barwon Health and Deakin University, SAV has been strongly supported by AMP Foundation in developing the Stay at Work Initiative. AMP Foundation's support for this program has been invaluable in assisting a form of return to work for large numbers of Stroke Survivors in the Barwon Region. AMP Foundation are our biggest supporter and most involved partner and we can't thank them enough for their ongoing support and contribution.

However, having said this, there is still much to be done to encourage partnerships within community groups and to continue the development of Community Stroke Support Centres within all Victorian health regions. Whilst we are confident that the State Government will provide a level of support to assist with the roll out of the Centre Model over the next three years, we must also ensure that each Centre has appropriate community partnerships to fund the continuing operation of each site.

The focus of the SAV is always to provide Stroke Survivors and their Carers with access to services and advice, which enhance their physical and cognitive recovery. We are so fortunate to have on our Board, Dr Carli Roulston and Dr Wei-Peng Teo, from the Florey Institute and Deakin University respectively, who are educating our Board and staff on the recovery process in general and providing leadership into recovery-based programs, which will be rolled out across all our Centres.

I am so grateful for the support that I have received from the Board, including Deputy Chairman, Bob Slater, who has guided me and also provided numerous introductions to key contacts within Rotary and Melbourne University.

Finally, but most importantly, I would like to thank our dedicated staff and volunteers who have done the heavy lifting at the coal face to allow the Board to concentrate on the expansion of SAV and have been willing to donate extra time for the benefit of our Stroke Survivors and their Carers.

SAV exists to support all those affected by Stroke; our efforts continue to be inspired by their determination, resilience and courage.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Stroke Association of Victoria Inc. (the association), which comprises the Statement by Members of the Committee, Income and Expenditure Statement, Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2018, a summary of significant accounting policies and the certification by members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.
